2. Entry Forms Must be Filled Out. Entry Forms are available online at www.beavertonfallfair.ca or at the Beaverton Library or in Beaverton area schools after Labour Day. Please include name of Public School and Age on Entry Form
3. Drop off Exhibits Thursday between 1:00 pm – 8:00 pm. All exhibits MUST be in place until between 10:00 am – 11:00 am Sunday. Articles cannot be stored. Prize money will be available on Sunday in the Scout Hall between 10:00 am – 11:00 am
4. Please make sure your name/exhibitor number/school is on the Exhibitor ticket. Numbers are obtained at registration. If you are entering an Adult Class, then you must go to the Curling Club to obtain an Adult Exhibitor Number and pay the Exhibitor Membership Fee of \$5.00
5. Exhibitors must enter the grade level they were at on the first day of school this year.

6. The exhibitor must do all work! Parents are urged to encourage their children in every way but let them do the work!
7. No exhibitor may enter more than one entry in any section.
